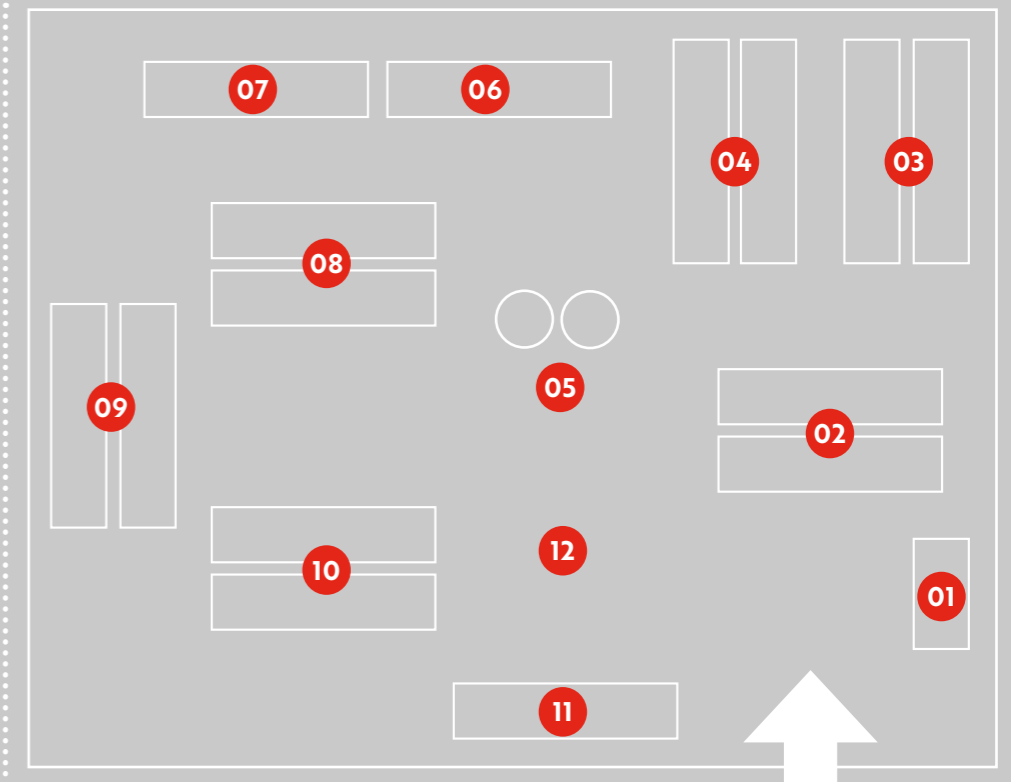

Through the transformative process of remapping, we have breathed new life into these objects, resulting in visually stunning representations that captivate the imagination and offer glimpses into their remarkable stories.

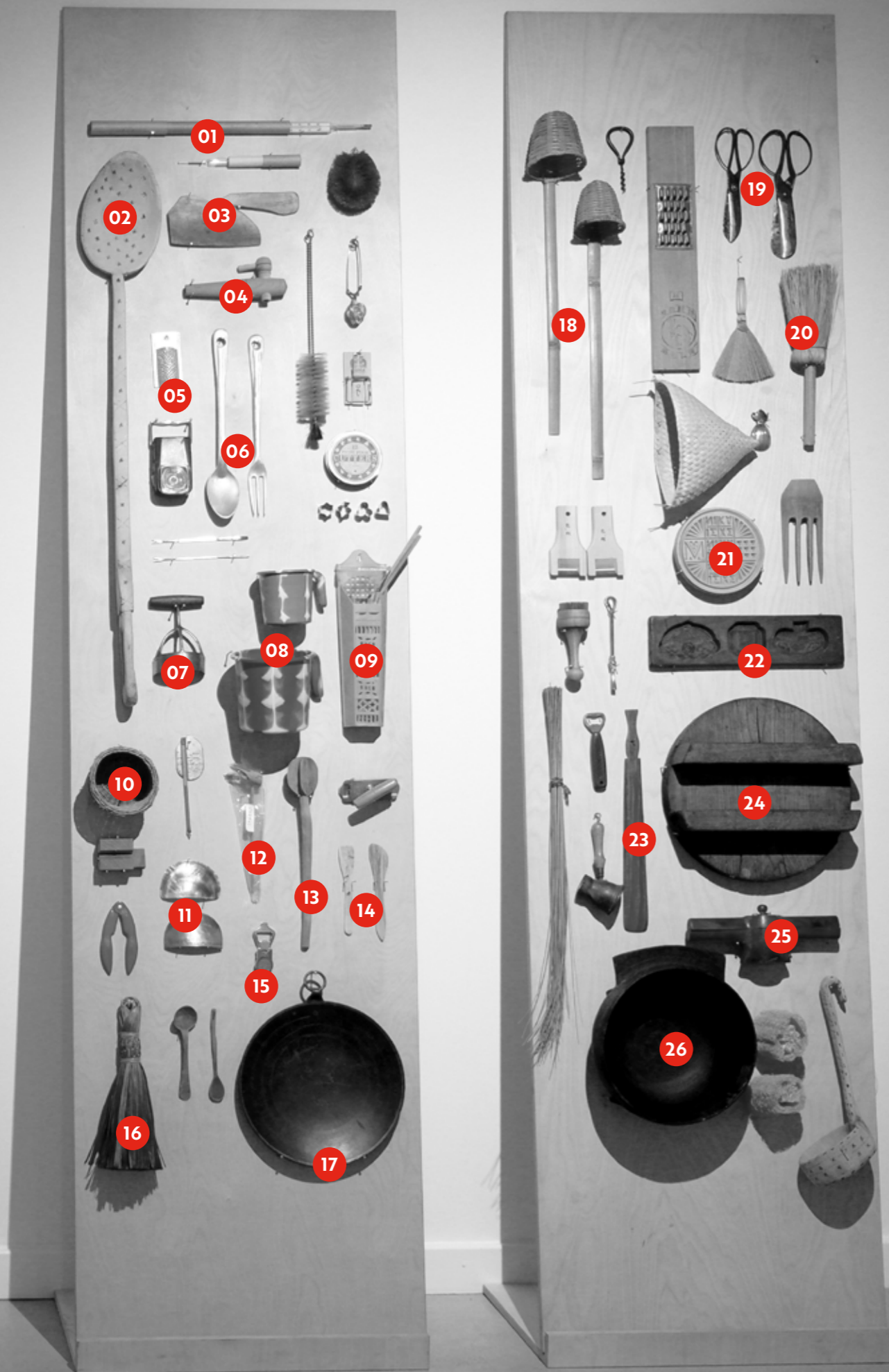

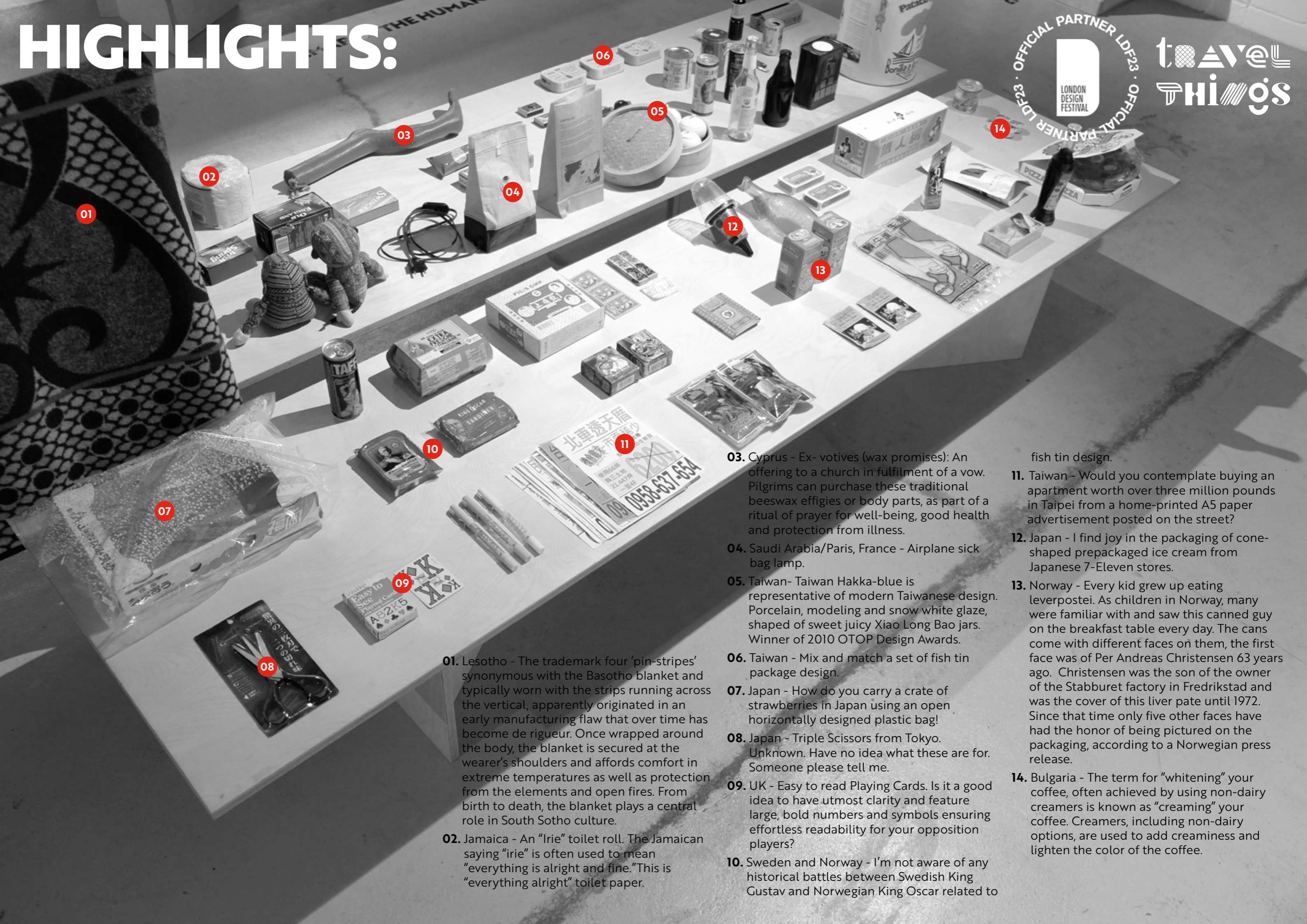

HIGHLIGHTS:

- 01.** Latvia - Alcohol thermometer.
- 02.** Bulgaria - Large wooden ladle/ spatula for outdoor and large pot cooking.
- 03.** Romania - A wooden aubergine chopper.
- 04.** Romania- Wooden Cask Taps.
- 05.** Jamaica - Jamaican style of nutmeg grater.
- 06.** Jamaica - Jamaican Dutch Pot (aluminium), cooking fork and spoon set.
- 07.** UK - Vintage antique kitchen food chopper
- 08.** UAE - Playful set of pots with handle from Dubai.
- 09.** Taiwan -Vintage wall mounted household dustproof chopstick cage
- 10.** Cyprus - Cypriot traditional Halloumi cheese basket. Making halloumi in Cyprus after separating the sheep & goats milk into curds & whey the curds are pressed into the baskets again & again pressing out the whey. Then cooked for around 45 minutes at the end adding salt & dried mint.
- 11.** Palau- One old and one new taro peelers. The growing of Taro in Palau in the Western Pacific Ocean is important to the country's cultural heritage as well as being a staple part of the Palauan diet. Taro peelers were originally made from giant clam shells. It is fascinating to see how the modern world replicates traditional craftsmanship especially in important everyday items such as the taro peeler. Koror Palau Micronesia
- 12.** Japan - Traditional udon bamboo serving forks /Ladle.
- 13.** Colombia - Molinillo Whisk - Handmade Wooden Chocolate Whisk. The nearly foot-long wooden whisk has been used for centuries in Central America to make perfect hot cocoa.
- 14.** Sweden- Traditional Swedish wooden butter knife. These knives are perfectly formed to butter your morning toast.
- 15.** Japan - Compact and foldable, retro Sizzler Bottle Cap & Opener is a daily kitchen essential. It works great as a multifunctional tool to open, seal and keep your sparkling beverage fresh all at the same time.
- 16.** St Lucia - Handmade small Latanyé leaves brush
- 17.** UAE - Dubai metal frying pan. A traditional cooking pan with a ring to hang it and a geometric pattern etched into the metal.
- 18.** Taiwan - Two authentic bamboo noodle strainers.
- 19.** Myanmar - Burmese artisan blacksmith scissors from Nan Pan market near Inle Lake
- 20.** Spain - An esparto grass hand broom
- 21.** Greece - Holy bread stamp (Holy Bread Prospora Seal) and Holy bread (Greek Orthodox Eucharistic bread) from Corfu island.
- 22.** South Korea -Korean antique hand carved wooden molds used for making rice cakes at Chinese New Year. They are also called moon cakes because they are eaten on the first full moon of each year. The mooncakes themselves, whether made with these special molds or just patted into oval shapes, carry a symbolic meaning of peace, harmony and the family circle.
- 23.** Maldives - Traditional Maldivian neem wooden spatula spoon for cooking chapati, dosa & roti.
- 24.** Japan - Traditional Japanese rice cooker wooden lid .
- 25.** Sri Lanka - Wooden string hopper maker / Idiyappam murukku sevai noodle maker.
- 26.** Saudi Arabia - Wooden bowl used in goat milking.

01. Lesotho - The trademark four 'pin-stripes' synonymous with the Basotho blanket and typically worn with the strips running across the vertical, apparently originated in an early manufacturing flaw that over time has become de rigueur. Once wrapped around the body, the blanket is secured at the wearer's shoulders and affords comfort in extreme temperatures as well as protection from the elements and open fires. From birth to death, the blanket plays a central role in South Sotho culture.

02. Jamaica - An "Irie" toilet roll. The Jamaican saying "irie" is often used to mean "everything is alright and fine." This is "everything alright" toilet paper.

03. Cyprus - Ex- votives (wax promises): An offering to a church in fulfilment of a vow. Pilgrims can purchase these traditional beeswax effigies or body parts, as part of a ritual of prayer for well-being, good health and protection from illness.

04. Saudi Arabia/Paris, France - Airplane sick bag lamp.

05

05. Taiwan- Taiwan Hakka-blue is representative of modern Taiwanese design. Porcelain, modeling and snow white glaze, shaped of sweet juicy Xiao Long Bao jars. Winner of 2010 OTOP Design Awards.

06. Taiwan - Mix and match a set of fish tin package design.

07. Japan - How do you carry a crate of strawberries in Japan using an open horizontally designed plastic bag!

08. Japan - Triple Scissors from Tokyo. Unknown. Have no idea what these are for. Someone please tell me.

09. UK - Easy to read Playing Cards. Is it a good idea to have utmost clarity and feature large, bold numbers and symbols ensuring effortless readability for your opposition players?

12. Japan - I find joy in the packaging of cone-shaped prepackaged ice cream from Japanese 7-Eleven stores.

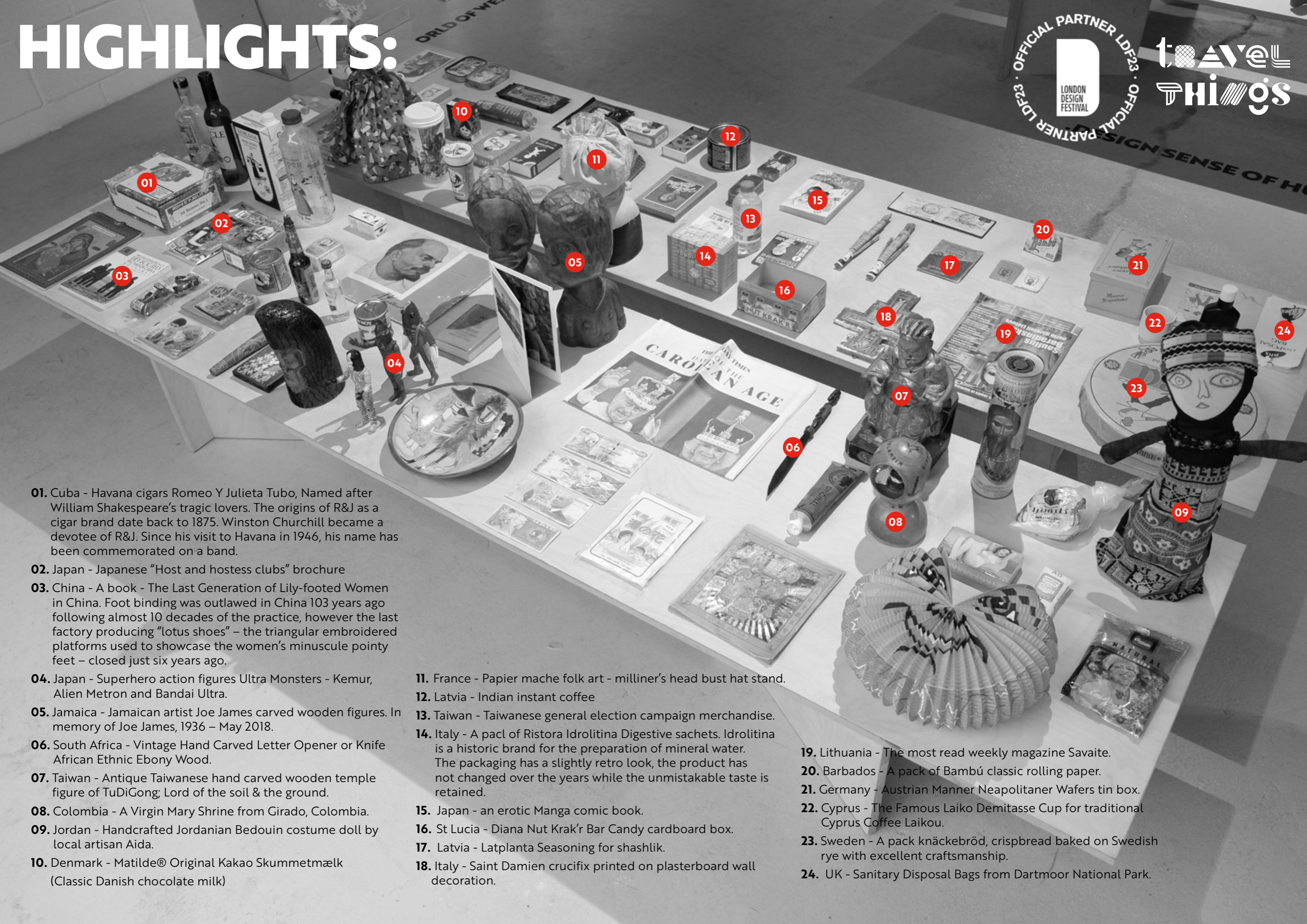

The cans come with different faces on them, the first face was of Per Andreas Christensen 63 years ago. Christensen was the son of the owner of the Stabburet factory in Fredrikstad and was the cover of this liver pate until 1972. Since that time only five other faces have had the honor of being pictured on the packaging, according to a Norwegian press release.

14. Bulgaria - The term for "whitening" your coffee, often achieved by using non-dairy creamers is known as "creaming" your coffee. Creamers, including non-dairy options, are used to add creaminess and lighten the color of the coffee.

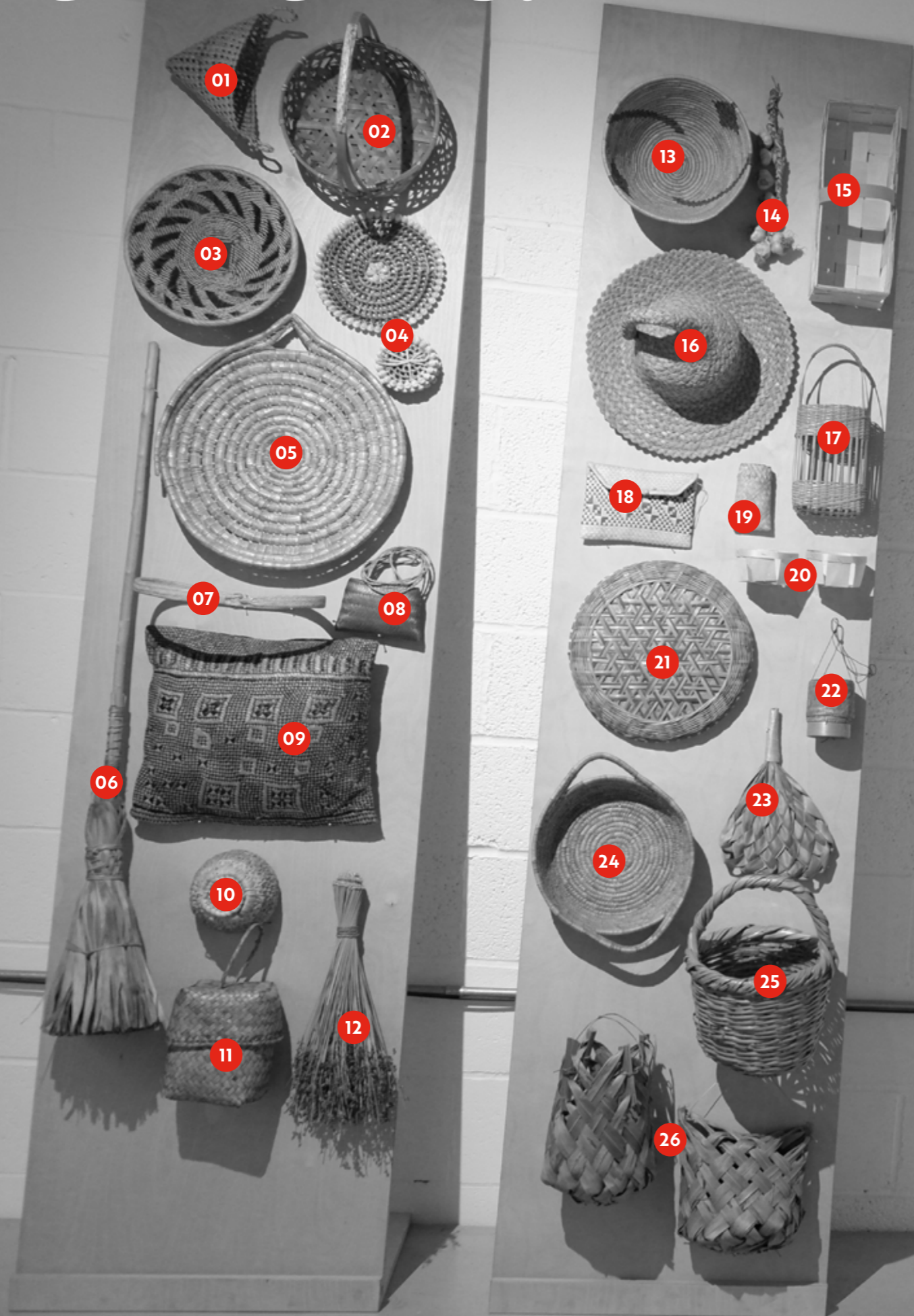


- 01. Cuba - Havana cigars Romeo Y Julieta Tubo, Named after William Shakespeare's tragic lovers. The origins of R&J as a cigar brand date back to 1875. Winston Churchill became a devotee of R&J. Since his visit to Havana in 1946, his name has been commemorated on a band.
- 02. Japan - Japanese "Host and hostess clubs" brochure
- 03. China - A book - The Last Generation of Lily-footed Women in China. Foot binding was outlawed in China 103 years ago following almost 10 decades of the practice, however the last factory producing "lotus shoes" – the triangular embroidered platforms used to showcase the women's minuscule pointy feet – closed just six years ago.
- 04. Japan - Superhero action figures Ultra Monsters - Kemur, Alien Metron and Bandai Ultra.
- 05. Jamaica - Jamaican artist Joe James carved wooden figures. In memory of Joe James, 1936 – May 2018.
- 06. South Africa - Vintage Hand Carved Letter Opener or Knife African Ethnic Ebony Wood.
- 07. Taiwan - Antique Taiwanese hand carved wooden temple figure of TuDiGong; Lord of the soil & the ground.
- 08. Colombia - A Virgin Mary Shrine from Girado, Colombia.
- 09. Jordan - Handcrafted Jordanian Bedouin costume doll by local artisan Aida.
- 10. Denmark - Matilde® Original Kakao Skummetmælk (Classic Danish chocolate milk)

- 11. France - Papier mache folk art - milliner's head bust hat stand.
- 12. Latvia - Indian instant coffee
- 13. Taiwan - Taiwanese general election campaign merchandise.
- 14. Italy - A pack of Ristora Idrolitina Digestive sachets. Idrolitina is a historic brand for the preparation of mineral water. The packaging has a slightly retro look, the product has not changed over the years while the unmistakable taste is retained.
- 15. Japan - an erotic Manga comic book.
- 16. St Lucia - Diana Nut Krak'r Bar Candy cardboard box.
- 17. Latvia - Latplanta Seasoning for shashlik.
- 18. Italy - Saint Damien crucifix printed on plasterboard wall decoration.

- 19. Lithuania - The most read weekly magazine Savaite.
- 20. Barbados - A pack of Bambú classic rolling paper.
- 21. Germany - Austrian Manner Neapolitaner Wafers tin box.
- 22. Cyprus - The Famous Laiko Demitasse Cup for traditional Cyprus Coffee Laikou.
- 23. Sweden - A pack knäckebröd, crispbread baked on Swedish rye with excellent craftsmanship.
- 24. UK - Sanitary Disposal Bags from Dartmoor National Park.

HIGHLIGHTS:



01. Sri Lanka - Jaffna traditional kitchen equipment: Neethu Peddi- A cone shaped Palmyrah leaf craft container.
02. Taiwan - A flat woven bamboo basket from near Maokong; Taipei.
03. Zambia - Beautifully woven basket bought in a local market. These are not for tourists but for daily use.
04. Bahamas - A hot pot stand and a set of coasters, all made from woven grass and shells bought at a local market.
05. North Cyprus - Panerka or Tsestoi (in Greek paneria) were weaved, circular, shallow to flat tray baskets. An indispensable item of the traditional Cypriot households across the island.
06. St Lucia - Latanyé leaves broom from Castries Central Market.
07. Philippines - Filipino rattan woven belt
08. Philippines - Ifugao Woven Rattan Money purse.
09. Philippines - The Tagolwanen sodsod woven cushion case from Bukidnon.
10. Cyprus - This gourd shape vessel called: Korokolios. This was a popular item amongst farmers and herders who would use this type of korokolios vessel to carry their lunch, typically including olives and halloumi cheese.
11. Mauritius - Traditional grass woven lunch bag
12. Cyprus - The broom we have from Cyprus is known as a froucali and is made from a plant called juncus effusus which grows most commonly in wetlands.
13. Tanzania - Tanzanian woven bowl.
14. Cyprus - Braided garlic bulbs from OXI veggie market in Nicosia, Cyprus.
15. Lithuania - Biodegradable wooden trug for harvesting fruit or mushrooms from the old town of Vilnius, Lithuania.
16. Lesotho - Mokorotlo, a widely used traditional Basotho hat. The national symbol of Lesotho.
17. Taiwan - Local indigenous Atayal style of bamboo woven basket from Wulai Taipei.
18. Kiribati - Handmade Kiribati Pandani Purse.
19. Palau - Palauan betel nut woven pouch
20. France - Wooden strawberry boxes from farmers market of Antibes, French Riviera.
21. China - Yunnan bamboo plate featuring handmade knit round basket.
22. Thailand - Sticky rice basket called Kratip, a container or sticky rice Steamer Basket.
23. Thailand - Coconut leaf handwoven fan
24. Philippines - A handwoven pan basket with two handles
25. Cyprus - On the island, cane from reeds is used to make these hard cane baskets
26. Seychelles - Seychellois artisan palm leaf baskets from Mont Fleuri Rd, fresh fruit & veg local market.
